



PRAYER OF THE DAY

WORD

God speaks to us in scripture reading, preaching, and song.

FIRST READING Genesis 1:1-2:4a

In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters. Then God said, "Let there be light"; and there was light. And God saw that the light was good; and God separated the light from the darkness. God called the light Day, and the darkness he called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day.

And God said, "Let there be a dome in the midst of the waters, and let it separate the waters from the waters." So God made the dome and separated the waters that were under the dome from the waters that were above the dome. And it was so. God called the dome Sky. And there was evening and there was morning, the second day.

And God said, "Let the waters under the sky be gathered together into one place, and let the dry land appear." And it was so. God called the dry land Earth, and the waters that were gathered together he called Seas. And God saw that it was good. Then God said, "Let the earth put forth vegetation: plants yielding seed, and fruit trees of every kind on earth that bear fruit with the seed in it." And it was so. The earth brought forth vegetation: plants yielding seed of every kind, and trees of every kind bearing fruit with the seed in it. And God saw that it was good. And there was evening and there was morning, the third day.

And God said, "Let there be lights in the dome of the sky to separate the day from the night; and let them be for signs and for seasons and for days and years, and let them be lights in the dome of the sky to give light upon the earth." And it was so. God made the two great lights—the greater light to rule the day and the lesser light to rule the night—and the stars. God set them in the dome of the sky to give light upon the earth, to rule over the day and over the night, and to separate the light from the darkness. And God saw that it was good. And there was evening and there was morning, the fourth day.

And God said, "Let the waters bring forth swarms of living creatures, and let birds fly above the earth across the dome of the sky." So God created the great sea monsters and every living creature that moves, of every kind, with which the waters swarm, and every winged bird of every kind. And God saw that it was good. God blessed them, saying, "Be fruitful and multiply and fill the waters in the seas, and let birds multiply on the earth." And there was evening and there was morning, the fifth day.

And God said, "Let the earth bring forth living creatures of every kind: cattle and creeping things and wild animals of the earth of every kind." And it was so. God made the wild animals of the earth of every kind, and the cattle of every kind, and everything that creeps upon the ground of every kind. And God saw that it was good.

Then God said, "Let us make humankind in our image, according to our likeness; and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the birds of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the wild animals of the earth, and over every creeping thing that creeps upon the earth."

So God created humankind in his image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them.

God blessed them, and God said to them, "Be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth and subdue it; and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves upon the earth." God said, "See, I have given you every plant yielding seed that is upon the face of all the earth, and every tree with seed in its fruit; you shall have them for food. And to every beast of the earth, and to every bird of the air, and to everything that creeps on the earth, everything that has the breath of life, I have given every green plant for food." And it was so. God saw everything that he had made, and indeed, it was very good. And there was evening and there was morning, the sixth day.

Thus the heavens and the earth were finished, and all their multitude. And on the seventh day God finished the work that he had done, and he rested on the seventh day from all the work that he had done. So God blessed the seventh day and hallowed it, because on it God rested from all the work that he had done in creation.

These are the generations of the heavens and the earth when they were created.




SETTING THE TABLE







The foundational premise of this set of daily readings is their relationship to the Sunday lectionary. The readings are chosen so that the days leading up to Sunday (Thursday through Saturday) prepare for the Sunday readings. The days flowing out from Sunday (Monday through Wednesday) reflect upon the Sunday readings.

THE READINGS IN THE BIBLE

Genesis 1:1-2:4a

Composed by Priestly sources perhaps as a liturgical text during the Babylonian exile, Genesis 1 presents God's ordering of the earth as an entirely good thing. The chapter specifically counters Babylonian values and its creation myths by giving to God all power on earth and by claiming a positive relationship between humans and God.

Psalm 8 exemplifies the way that the Bible has been used in the development of Christian doctrine. Appropriate as a response to Genesis 1, the psalm praises God the creator, who is addressed as both YHWH, thus Lord, and Adonai, thus Lord or Master. The psalm states that human beings were created by God and given authority over creation. Because Hebrew was an androcentric language, human beings were spoken of in verse 4 as a single male, "man." This praise of a man was seen in the early church as a description of Jesus Christ and thus became important for trinitarian theology. Some current psalm translations are cast in nongender-specific plural, to make clear that the Hebrew meant "human beings." Contemporary Christians stress the responsibility of the care for creation that God has given to humankind.

2 Corinthians 13:11-13

Perhaps a compilation of several of Paul's letters written between 55 and 57, 2 Corinthians indicates that the relationship between Paul and the Corinthian community had deteriorated. Paul defended his own ministry, warned against rival leaders and their styles, and urged a collection for the Jerusalem poor. The present text concludes with a rhetorically authoritative trinitarian benediction.

Matthew 28:16-20

Concluding his gospel on a mountain in Galilee, Matthew reiterates his themes: Jesus' continuing presence in the church, the authority of the disciples, a worldwide ministry, and the call to obedience. There is no ascension. Often mountains in Scripture are places of significant religious events, and with this conclusion Matthew responded to the line in Mark that the disciples would see the risen Lord in Galilee.
